## Agave Fiber Crafts in Guatemala and Ecuador

On Monday January 26, 2009 at 7:00 pm at the Shepard Garden and Arts Center, special guest, Kathleen Mossman Vitale, cofounder and CEO of the nonprofit Endangered Threads Documentaries, will give a presentation on Agave Fiber Crafts in Guatemala and Ecuador. The Sacramento Cactus & Succulent Society invites you to this special showing of film clips planned for a documentary under development.

Indigenous people of the Americas have used fibers from plants in the Agave family to make utilitarian objects for many centuries, including shoes, rope, mats and carrying bags. Kathleen has filmed native people in the highlands of Guatemala and Ecuador for her study of these endangered crafts. Her travels have taken her to areas where indigenous languages predominate, and where artisans use implements passed down through the centuries.

Kathleen and her husband, Paul, were Peace Corps Volunteers in Ecuador in the early 60s. After their tour was over, they returned to Ecuador where the U.S. Foreign Service

employed Paul. Subsequent assignments placed them in South American for a total of 13 years. Kathleen learned her love of textiles from her mother, who collected worldwide, and whose collection was donated to the Phoebe Hearst Museum at UC Berkeley.
